In June 2023, Commissioner Buckingham, who played an integral part in advocating for Alamo funding, was thrilled to celebrate the passage of a historic \$400 million allocation for the Alamo Plan, which was included in the state's budget signed by Governor Greg Abbott and championed by Lt. Governor Dan Patrick. This funding supports several construction projects, including the Alamo Plaza, Alamo church, and Cenotaph.

The Alamo Visitor Center and Museum will be a world-class facility dedicated to preserving the Alamo's 300-year history and sharing this core of Texas' cultural identity. Texans and visitors worldwide will gain a deeper appreciation and understanding of the Alamo by exploring the museum's eight immersive galleries and experiencing a state-of-the-art 4D theater. This project is scheduled for completion in 2027.

The Alamo Plan has three pillars that make up its foundation of conservation. They are to preserve the 300-year-old Church and Long Barrack, recapture the original mission site and battlefield footprint, and create a world-class Visitor Center and Museum to tell the full history of the site.
